1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1** This manual establishes a set of operational procedures governing the receipt, delivery, handling, transportation, processing, storage and the sale of by-catch fish landed in Mauritius and Rodrigues.
- 1.2** Pursuant to section 108 of the Fisheries Act, the Ministry of Agro-Industry, Food Security, Blue Economy and Fisheries (Blue Economy and Fisheries Division) issues fishing licences to foreign longline tuna fishing vessels, authorising them to catch tuna and tuna-like species in the Exclusive Economic Zone of Mauritius. These vessels not only catch tuna and tuna-like species, but also incidentally capture other species collectively referred to as by-catch fish, which are classified as ‘controlled products’ under the Mauritius Agricultural Marketing (Controlled Products) Regulations 2025.
- 1.3** All by-catch fish landed by licenced foreign tuna longliners in Port Louis must be purchased by a buying agent appointed by the Agricultural Marketing Board (AMB), as per the Mauritius Agricultural Marketing Act 1963. These by-catch fish are purchased from the vessels ‘captains at prices fixed under the Mauritius Agricultural Marketing (Controlled Products) Regulations 2025.
- 1.4** However, foreign tuna longliners that are not licenced by the Ministry of Agro-Industry, Food Security, Blue Economy and Fisheries (Blue Economy and Fisheries Division), i.e., operating outside the Exclusive Economic

Zone, were previously under no legal obligation to sell their by-catch fish to AMB. These non-licenced vessels could sell directly to local buyers at any price and quantity, provided that these buyers are registered as importers of fish and fish products at the Fisheries Division of the Ministry.

- 1.5** With effect from 8 August 2025, the Government of Mauritius has implemented legal amendments to ensure that the regulation of by-catch fish from both licenced and non-licenced tuna longline fishing vessels falls under the authority of AMB.
- 1.6** To this end, a Standard Operations Procedures (SOP) manual has been established, approved by the Board and the Ministry and shall serve as a legally binding manual for all parties involved in by-catch transactions.

2. DEFINITION OF BY-CATCH FISH AND LEGAL BASIS

2.1. As per the Mauritius Agricultural Marketing (Controlled Products) Regulations 2025, “by-catch fish” means fish species caught by-

(i) a foreign tuna longline fishing vessel that holds a valid and applicable fishing licence issued under section 108 of the Fisheries Act 2023; or

(ii) a foreign tuna longline fishing vessel, other than a foreign tuna longline fishing vessel that holds a valid and applicable fishing licence issued under section 108 of the Fisheries Act 2023; and

includes –

(i) fish species specified in Part A of the First Schedule; and

(ii) downgraded fish specified in Part A of the Second Schedule.

“downgraded fish” means fish damaged through fishing or handling operations.

2.2. Legal basis

This SOP is issued pursuant to:

- a) The Mauritius Agricultural Marketing Act 1963
- b) The Fisheries Act 2023
- c) The Mauritius Agricultural Marketing (Controlled Products) Regulations 2025 (**Refer to Annex 3**)
- d) Any relevant Government Notices (GNs)

3. CLASSIFICATION OF STAKEHOLDERS

- i. "**Board**" means the Agricultural Marketing Board established under section 3 of the Mauritius Agricultural Marketing Act 1963;
- ii. "**Buying agent**" means any person authorised by the Board to acquire any controlled product by purchase on behalf of the Board;
- iii. "**Controlled product**" means any product of Mauritius and any imported product, declared by the Minister under section 13 to be a controlled product;
- iv. "**Cooperative society**" means any cooperative society which is registered under the Cooperative Societies Act;
- v. "**Operator**" in relation to a fishing vessel –
 - (a) means any person who –
 - i. is in charge of the fishing vessel;
 - ii. is responsible for the operations of the fishing vessel; or
 - iii. directs or controls the vessel; and
 - (b) includes the owner, agent, charterer or master of the fishing vessel, or the beneficiary of the economic or financial benefit of the operations of the fishing vessel;

4. REGISTRATION OF STAKEHOLDERS

4.1. In accordance with section 16 of the Mauritius Agricultural Marketing Act 1963, every buying agent shall, prior to commencement of their activities and subsequently by 01 January of each calendar year, register his name with the AMB. The buying agent shall comply with the provisions of the Act and the 2025 regulations.

4.2. The AMB reserves the rights to appoint one or multiple buying agents to ensure transparent and fair allocation of by-catch fish.

4.3. The buying agent must possess and submit the following mandatory statutory and supporting documents as part of the enlistment process:

- a) Business Registration Number (BRN);
- b) Certificate of Incorporation / Registration (as applicable);
- c) Valid Import Permit issued by the Fisheries Division;
- d) Valid Fishmonger's Licence issued by the Fisheries Division;
- e) Certificate of Character of Directors / Office Bearers;
- f) Copy of National Identity Card of Directors / Shareholders;
- g) Proof of bank account and financial capacity;
- h) Details of storage facilities;
- i) Logistics capacity (including vehicles and horsepower);
- j) Food Handler's Certificate of representatives;
- k) Any other document as may be required by the Board.

The above documents shall constitute the minimum eligibility requirements for consideration and enlistment as a buying agent by the Board.

4.4. The Board shall establish terms, conditions and applicable fees for the registration of all stakeholders, including cooperative societies, importers and distribution entities, as it may deem fit.

4.5. Registration shall be mandatory for all stakeholders involved in the handling, purchase, sale or distribution of by-catch fish.

5. DUTIES, RESPONSIBILITIES AND OBLIGATIONS OF STAKEHOLDERS

The Board shall have the powers to:

- a) define the duties and responsibilities of all stakeholders and regulate the conduct of the by-catch trade in Mauritius, including the requirement to maintain accurate and verifiable records;
- b) require each stakeholder to submit relevant and timely information concerning their operations, as deemed necessary by the Board;
- c) require stakeholders to grant free and unrestricted access for inspection of their records, vehicles, storage facilities and trading premises by authorized officers.

5.1. Buying agent

A buying agent appointed by the Board shall be required to inter-alia:

- a) Apply for all necessary permits and licences, including those under the Fisheries Act 2023 and Import of fish and fish products Regulations 2012 as amended;
- b) Cover all operational expenses relating to the collection, removal and handling of by-catch fish;
- c) Purchase, procure, acquire, sell or dispose of by-catch on behalf of the AMB, strictly at prices fixed under Part B of the First and Second Schedules of

- the Mauritius Agricultural Marketing (Controlled Products) Regulations 2025;
- a) Operate within a commission structure authorised by the Board, which shall be reviewed periodically;
 - b) Comply fully with all provisions in the Mauritius Agricultural Marketing (Controlled Products) Regulations 2025, as well as guidance or directives issued by the AMB.
 - c) Ensure that all imports of by-catch fish are sourced through AMB authorised channels and accompanied by fish landing authorisations and valid delivery clearances issued by the Fisheries Division of the Ministry;
 - d) Maintain accurate and verifiable records of import volumes, species, purchase prices and final distribution;
 - e) Permit the AMB, Fisheries Division, and other authorised agencies to conduct inspections of records, storage facilities and distribution chains at any reasonable time;
 - f) Adhere strictly to the price structure and species list established under the 2025 Regulations;
 - g) Provide timely operational data, including inventory levels and sales information, as requested by the AMB or the Ministry.

Note: Buying agents shall be issued identification badges as per Annex 1.

5.2. Operator

The operator of a foreign tuna longline fishing vessel shall:

- i. Ensure full compliance with the Mauritius Agricultural Marketing (Controlled Products) Regulations 2025, including restrictions on the unauthorized removal of by-catch fish;
- ii. Facilitate inspections and declarations in accordance with PSCU, IOTC, e-PSM Platform requirements and other relevant procedures;
- iii. Bear responsibility for any breaches by their crew, agent or vessel during the port call;

5.3. Cooperative societies

A cooperative society registered under the Cooperative Societies Act and authorised by the Board shall:

- Register annually with the Agricultural Marketing Board (AMB) as a stakeholder in accordance with section 16 of the Mauritius Agricultural Marketing Act 1963;
- Hold a valid import permit issued by the Fisheries Division in accordance with the Fisheries and Marine Resources (Import of Fish and Fish Products) Regulations 2012;
- Receive and distribute by-catch fish allocated by the AMB-appointed buying agent under a quota or roster system established by the Board;

- Ensure that all quantities of by-catch fish received are properly recorded, stored, and distributed in compliance with the Standard Operations Procedures (SOP) manual and applicable health and safety regulations;
- Submit to the AMB all required reports, invoices, and verification documents for audit and compliance purposes;
- Allow full and unrestricted access to authorised officers for inspection of premises, cold storage facilities, and records.

5.4. The Fisheries Division of the Ministry of Agro Industry, Food Security, Blue Economy and Fisheries

The Fisheries Division of the Ministry of Agro-Industry, Food Security, Blue Economy and Fisheries shall:

- Issue valid import permits and delivery clearances for by-catch fish under the Fisheries and Marine Resources (Import of Fish and Fish Products) Regulations 2012 after verification of all necessary documentation, including fish landing authorisations;
- Verify compliance of foreign tuna longline vessels with all applicable fisheries laws and international obligations (e.g. IOTC e-PSM Platform);
- Deploy Fisheries Control Officers to monitor the offloading, weighing and handling of by-catch fish at designated sites;
- Ensure the traceability and legality of by-catch

fish through inspections and the verification of vessel identity, species landed and estimated weights;

- Submit recommendations to the AMB's Price Committee regarding trends in catch, species availability and international market dynamics;
- Assist the AMB in enforcing the Mauritius Agricultural Marketing (Controlled Products) Regulations 2025, including investigation and prosecution of offences under Regulation 5.

6. HANDLING OF BY-CATCH OPERATIONS AT AMB'S LEVEL

All by-catch operations falling under the purview of the Agricultural Marketing Board (AMB) shall be executed in strict adherence to the Standard Operations Procedures (SOP) approved by the Board and the Ministry.

The formalities related to the receipt, weighing, documentation, storage and distribution of by-catch fish shall be carried out under the direct supervision of the Head Operations Officer (HOO).

The HOO shall be accompanied or assisted by a Senior Operations Officer and an Operations Officer to ensure transparency, compliance with legal protocols and accuracy of records.

The designated point of contact for all such operations is the Trou Fanfaron Fish Cold Store, where the sealed trucks carrying the by-catch fish are weighed and verified in the presence of authorized officers. Note: AMB staff involved in operations shall carry identification badges as per Annex 2

7. PROTOCOL FOR THE REMOVAL OF BY-CATCH FISH ORIGINATING FROM FOREIGN TUNA LONGLINE FISHING VESSELS CALLING AT THE PORT IN MAURITIUS AND RODRIGUES

- a) Prior to arrival of the foreign tuna longline fishing vessel, the Fisheries Division must be notified. The vessel's intended landing and/or re-export must be declared via the IOTC e-PSM Platform.
- b) Upon arrival of the fishing vessel, the Fisheries Division will verify all submitted documents, board the vessel, conduct a compliance inspection and issue a landing authorization, stating the estimated weight and species of by-catch and re-export fish.
- c) The vessel agent shall inform the AMB and its buying agents on the vessel's arrival and status.
- d) The buying agent must apply for an import permit and delivery clearance from the Fisheries Division through the TradeNet Portal on behalf of AMB.
- e) Issue of the import permit is conditional upon verification of:
 - Vessel identity (Name & Flag);
 - Species names (Common and scientific);
 - Estimated weights as per the landing authorization;
 - Submission of a copy of the fish landing authorization from the Fisheries Division via the TradeNet Portal.

- f) Once approval is granted:
- The vessel is authorized to unload the by catch;
 - Officers of the Fisheries Division monitor the offloading process;
 - Enhanced supervision applies to CITES listed species or high risk vessels and at least 5% of all vessel calls must be fully monitored in line with IOTC Resolution 16/11.
- g) The buying agent shall negotiate the purchase of by-catch fish directly with the vessel captain in accordance with the regulated price schedules of the Mauritius Agricultural Marketing (Controlled Products) Regulations 2025. A translator may be engaged where language barriers may exist.
- h) The buying agent shall:
- Apply for access passes and vehicle authorization;
 - Submit all required port entry documents to the MRA, MPA and Ministry of Wellness and Health;
 - Provide crew disembarkation details as needed.
- i) The by-catch fish is then loaded in refrigerated trucks at the quay and the duly sealed truck moves for weighing of the by-catch fish at the Trou Fanfaron Fish Cold Store of AMB or at an approved establishment under the supervision of the Fisheries Control Officer and/or Fisheries Enforcement Officer and any other person authorized by the Board. The trucks must be initially tarred empty at the

designated weighbridge.

- j) The buying agent and/or the fishmonger cooperative society and/or companies holding import permits and/or any person authorized to deal in by-catch fish must pay a commission to the AMB. The current fees are Rs 10/kg (buying agent) and Rs 10/kg (AMB), subject to revision by the Board.
- k) The buying agent shall, as directed by AMB, distribute the by-catch to:
 - Approved fishmonger cooperative societies;
 - Import permit holders;
 - Entities authorized by the Board.
- l) The buying agent must ensure the timely submission of bill of entry to the MRA and adherence to a roster/quota system, established by the Board.
- m) The buying agent must ensure the timely submission of the catch document for Tuna and tuna like fish species validated by the Competent Authority of the Flag State of the fishing vessel as per the requirements of the Fisheries and Marine Resources (Import of Fish and Fish Products) Regulations 2012 as amended.

8. SETTING UP OF A PRICE COMMITTEE

Pursuant to section 7 of the Mauritius Agricultural Marketing Act 1963, the Board shall establish a Price Committee responsible for:

- Reviewing the purchase prices of by-catch fish on an annual basis;
- Submitting recommendations to the Board for approval;
- Ensuring price fairness for both licenced and non-licenced vessel operators and maintaining market stability.

The Committee The composition of the Price Committee, as approved by the Board of Directors of the AMB, is as follows:

- (i) Representative of the Ministry of Agro-Industry, Food Security, Blue Economy and Fisheries;
- (ii) Representative of the Ministry of Finance;
- (iii) Representative of the Ministry of Commerce and Consumer Protection;
- (iv) Representative of the Ministry of Cooperatives;
- (v) Representative of the Fisheries Division;
- (vi) Representatives of the AMB – General Manager / Assistant General Manager.

9. DEFINITION OF BY-CATCH SPECIES AND PURCHASE PRICES

The list of controlled species and corresponding purchase prices shall be governed by Government Notice No. 63 of 2025, as per the schedules in the 2025 regulations.

Prices are subject to review by the Price Committee and approval by the Board.

10. OFFENCES

Any breach of the provisions of the Mauritius Agricultural Marketing (Controlled Products) Regulations 2025 shall constitute an offence.

Specifically:

- a) A buying agent that fails to comply with regulation 4 (3) shall, upon conviction, be liable to a fine not exceeding Rs 1,000 and imprisonment not exceeding 12 months;
- b) An operator of a foreign tuna longline fishing vessel that fails to comply with regulation 5 (1) shall, upon conviction, be liable to the same penalties;
- c) Any buying agent failing to comply with regulation 5 (2) or 5 (3) or who does not exercise responsibility as directed by the operator under regulation 5 (1), shall also be liable to abovementioned penalties;
- d) Any other person who contravenes the 2025 regulations shall commit an offence and be subject to the same penal consequences.

11. ENFORCEMENT

The AMB shall:

- (i) Take all necessary measures to ensure compliance with this Standard Operations Procedures manual;
- (ii) Issue binding directives to stakeholders when deemed necessary in the public interest;
- (iii) The AMB shall ensure that stakeholders are legally obliged to comply with such directives without delay.

Government Notice No. 63 of 2025

THE MAURITIUS AGRICULTURAL MARKETING ACT

Regulations made by the Minister, on the advice of the Agricultural Marketing Board, under sections 13, 14 and 27 of the Mauritius Agricultural Marketing Act

1. These regulations may be cited as the Mauritius Agricultural Marketing (Controlled Products) Regulations 2025.

2. In these regulations –

“by-catch fish” –

(a) means fish species caught by –

(i) a foreign tuna longline fishing vessel that holds a valid and applicable fishing licence issued under section 108 of the Fisheries Act 2023; or

(ii) a foreign tuna longline fishing vessel, other than a foreign tuna longline fishing vessel that holds a valid and applicable fishing licence issued under section 108 of the Fisheries Act 2023; and

(b) includes –

(i) fish species specified in Part A of the First Schedule; and

(ii) downgraded fish specified in Part A of the Second Schedule.

“downgraded fish” means fish damaged through fishing or handling operations;

“operator”, in relation to a fishing vessel –

(a) means any person who –

(i) is in charge of the fishing vessel;

(ii) is responsible for the operations of the fishing vessel; or

(iii) directs or controls the vessel; and

(b) includes the owner, agent, charterer or master of the fishing vessel, or the beneficiary of the economic or financial benefit of the operations of the fishing vessel;

"Standard Operations Procedures" means the Standard Operations Procedures referred to in regulation 6.

3. For the purpose of section 13 of the Act, by-catch fish and the products specified in the Third and Fourth Schedules are declared to be controlled products in Mauritius and Rodrigues.

4. (1) No person shall remove or purchase by-catch fish originating from foreign tuna longline fishing vessels calling at the port in Mauritius and Rodrigues unless he is appointed as a buying agent by the Board.

(2) No person shall be appointed as a buying agent unless he –

(a) has the proven financial capacity to purchase by-catch fish from foreign fishing vessels; and

(b) has suitable cold storage facilities, whether being the owner of the cold storage facilities or not, and appropriate logistics for the removal of by-catch fish from foreign fishing vessels.

(3) The Board or its buying agent shall buy by-catch fish at the price specified in Part B of the First and Second Schedules, respectively.

(4) A buying agent that fails to comply with paragraph (3) shall commit an offence and shall, on conviction, be liable to a fine not exceeding 1,000 rupees and to imprisonment for a term not exceeding 12 months.

5. (1) The operator of a foreign tuna longline fishing vessel shall ensure that no by-catch fish is removed from such vessel during a call at the port of Mauritius unless it is effected by the Board or its designated buying agent in accordance with regulation 4.

(2) The buying agent shall cause the by-catch fish to be weighed at the Trou Fanfaron Fish Cold Store or at an approved establishment under the supervision of a Fisheries Control Officer and any other person authorised by the Board.

(3) The operator of a foreign tuna longline fishing vessel that fails to comply with paragraph (1) shall commit an offence and shall, on conviction, be liable to a fine not exceeding 1,000 rupees and to imprisonment for a term not exceeding 12 months.

(4) Any buying agent that fails to comply with paragraph (2) or does not exercise responsibility as directed by an operator under regulation 5(1) shall commit an offence and shall, on conviction, be liable to a fine not exceeding 1,000 rupees and to imprisonment for a term not exceeding 12 months.

6. There shall be, for the purpose of the receipt, delivery, purchase, handling, transportation, processing, storage and sale of by-catch fish, a manual to be known as the Standard Operations Procedures, which shall be approved by the Board.

7. (1) A Price Committee shall be set up, in accordance with section 7 of the Act, to make recommendations on the purchase prices of by-catch fish.

(2) The Committee shall meet at least once every year.

8. Any person who otherwise contravenes these regulations shall commit an offence and shall, on conviction, be liable to a fine not exceeding 1,000 rupees and to imprisonment for a term not exceeding 12 months.

9. The Mauritius Agricultural Marketing (Price of Controlled Products) (By-catch Fish) (Amendment) Regulations 2004 and the Mauritius Agricultural Marketing (Controlled Products) Regulations 2013 are revoked.

10. These regulations shall come into operation on 8 August 2025.
